## Terms Used In This List

Plate imprint blocks refer to blocks of six stamps.
Other blocks listed consist of four stamps.
Colls are invariably in pairs.
If strips of four are wanted double the price of pairs.
If strips of four showing the line in the centre are wanted add the price of a normal pair to a line palr.

## GULDE LINES AND ARROWS

For the guidance of those who wish to follow the text of this book we would like to lay down the following scheme to determine the position of a certain stamp or block. Plates of stamps are lald down with guide lines, thus:


Usually each plate has 400 impressions, which is cut down the guide lines to sheets of 100 , thus forming the following possible combination:
(1) The Top plate imprint and number
(2) The Bottom plate imprint and number
(3) The Left plate imprint and number
(4) The Right plate imprint and number

This disposes of the plates. The next thing is the relation of the cut line to the stamp. In this we find the following:
(5) Top left half of arrow
(6) Top right half of arrow
(7) Upper half arrow at left
(8) Lower half arrow at left
(9) Angle of line bottom and right
(10) Angle of line bottom and left
(11) Upper half arrow at right
(12) Lower half arrow at right
(13) Angle of line top and right
(14) Angle of line top and left
(15) Bottom left half of arrow
(16) Bottom right half of arrow

This, of course, is "shaking the life out of the rat" and is of lnterest to but very few people and not worth listing out; still at the same time it is just as well to get the ldea in ones mind of the general layout of the sheets so that no combination may crop up that will puzzle even the most advanced specialist. Certain values we find printed in sheets of 200 which show left and right or top and bottom arrow blocks intact, viz., not cut. These were puzzling to many collectors before this final scheme explains their reason and existence. It is because of the peculiarlties to be found that
the collecting of arrow and guide blocks of unperforated stamps is an actual necessity-they are something that can only be found in an unperforated sheet, and it will be well to go into that subject a little further.

## UNPERFORATED STAMPS

Were first issued by the Government in 1907 to meet the demand of manufacturers of various styles of mailing machines. These machines were adapted to forms of separation that the Government did not supply. Figuratively speaking the Government said "here are unperforated sheets for you; go ahead and treat them with any kind of perforation you like." And they did. Thus we have the slot hole of the Mailometer and Schermack Companies, the notch of the U. S. Automatic Co., the five big holes of the Western Mailometer and the two holes of the Brinkerhoff. All these companies seem to have sunk into what President Cleveland described as a state of inocuous desuetude with the exception of the Mailometer Company, which still continues to issue the slot reels. One sees them on circulars, telephone bills, etc., but the Rotary Press Coils of the Government are being more extensively used every day. We seem to have drifted from unperforated stamps to coils and it is pardonable, since the imperf. is the basis of the coil, but many collectors are still so densely ignorant of the meaning of coils and what they are that it is very necessary to explain them fully right here.

## COILS

Coils are reels of stamps put up by the Government for use by those who need them in mailing machines-affixing machines would be a more correct definition. The demand for coils first arose about 1907 and the Bureau of Printing \& Engraving made some rolls which they sold at face value plus a small charge of three or six cents for "reeling" them. There are two kinds of coils:
(a) Endwise
(b) Sidewise

The coils, up to the advent of the Rotary Press, were made by perforating the sheets one way only, then attaching the sheets end to end, and then cutting the imperforate spaces thus forming strips which were subsequently wound up into reels.

Thus we get two varieties not found in regular sheets:
(a) Perforated thro the line
(b) Perforated thro the joint

In the case of an endwise coil we get the sides vertically imperf, in the case of a sidewise coil we get the top and bottom imperf. These the Scott Catalogue describes as "Perf vertically" or "Perf horizontally" and it must be borne in mind that the prices the Scott catalogue quotes are for single copies. Which is about as much use as having a pair of pants and no coat. We have no
desire to find fault with this most excellent catalogue-we merely want to show the point of view of a specialist. Commencing with 1914 we find the manufacture of coils revolutionized and the old method of joining strips discarded for that wonderful machine known as the Rotary Press. This machine at present merely prints coil stamps on miles and miles of prepared paper. The stamps produced by this machine measure $191 / 2 \mathrm{~mm}$ instead of $181 / 2 \mathrm{~mm}$, are of a smooth pale colour and are on intensely tough smooth paper. Before dismissing colls from our notice we would like to note the existence of imperf colls, that is coils manufactured by the Government, joined and reeled without any perforations, but we do not list them because they cannot be told from imperf sheats that could be stripped and joined to produce the same effect. There is only one unperforated coil existing that justifles its being listed and that is the 2c sidewise Rotary with watermark and that coll is justified in receiving recognition because the stamp does not exist imperf in the Rotary printing in any other form.

## Wm'k Double Line U. S. P. S. Perf 12

Sometimes called the Pan American issue and often named the Buffalo issue. This little issue was the first bicoloured stamps we have had since 1869 and with the exception of the 90 c Lincoln the only stamps ever issued by the U. S. for postal use with black centres. As might be expected errors occurred of which more anon. The plates were laid down in impressions of 200 , and were cut horizontally to 100 impressions in which state they were issued. The gum on these stamps was heavy and the paper brittle, which accounts for so many "split" blocks on the market. Also as many smart people (including ourselves) tore the sheets down the arrow guide lines the scarcity of unbroken arrow blocks is painfully in evidence. Two plate numbers were used on the imprint; one for the frame and one for the vignette or centre. Considering the quantity issued the centre is remarkably accurate in most cases but ultra specialism shows the 1c and 2c stamps centred too far north, and south, or else shoved too far forward or too far back. Above the 2c miscentering is very unusual. The inverted centres are, of course, very rare. The one cent was found originally in Bessemer, Alabama, on some circulars sent out by a jewelry firm who very quickly soaked the balance of the stamps off the unmailed circulars when they found out what they had. The Two Cents was sold at the Brooklyn postoffice. A personal friend of the writers bought 5 copies for the humble dime. Two were sold by him to us at 375.00 a piece-Two we have now for sale at 550.00 a plece and the fifth one was used on a letter. Originally offered around at 10.00 the stamp has gradually risen to its present price and there is no doubt but what in the near future it will sell at 750.00 or even higher. The four cents inverted originated in Washington. Those with the word "Specimen" were given away by-we believe-General Madden. Those without Specimen came on the market a little time ago when the Museum in Washington exchanged some of its duplicates for stamps needed in the Government Collection. The 4 c has a great future and will undoubtedly look cheap at this quotation in a few years, as less than 100 were available. We tabulate the guide line variations as this issue was in an unusual form of make up. The paper used in this issue is a white porous wove and the gum is thick and quite yellowish. The entire series was issued March 1st, 1901, placed on sale May 1st, 1901.

## Wm'k Double Line U. S. P. S. Perf 12

This series was printed in subjects of 400 , and was cut down to sheets of 100 before issue in all values from 1 c to 10 c inclusive. The fifteen cent exists both in 400 and 200 subject plates. The $50 c, \$ 1, \$ 2$, $\$ 5$ only exist in 200 subjects. The 2 c value was in issue but a very few months and is scarce unused. We would seriously warn collectors against some very clever counterfeits of the coils-made by taking the imperf sheets and applying forged perforations. We luckily have a test for these which up to now has been infallible but prefer not to name it at present. It will be noticed that the 4 c stamp 303c is listed imperf-but in this condition it does not exist. It was issued imperf in Detroit but all known copies have the Schermack "slot" perforation. In a collection of private perfs this variety justly belongs-in a collection of straight Government perforations it is entirely out of place.

This sheet was formerly in the Worthington collection but was broken up and sold at auction, the price ranging in and around $\$ 60$ for a block of four. There are no side imprints in this issue.

Although this little series of stamps is embraced by twelve numbers in the Catalogue it is perhaps the hardest of all the series to work out.

In the first place we are confronted by a new problem which is caused by the Bureau of Printing \& Engraving laying down a new form of plate with variations of spacing between the stamps.

These plates, commonly known as "Star" plates, because they had a star added to the imprint, were produced in an effort to obviate the very bad perforations on so many of the sheets. As our stamps are printed by the old intaglio process it is necessary to dampen the sheets before taking the impression and when these sheets dry they shrink so that no set of perforation needles can

be put together that will perforate the stamps accurately since some of the sheets shrink one way and some shrink the other.

In the "Star" plates the six outer vertical rows are spaced 3 mm . between whilst the inner rows are spaced 2 mm . between. This difference the printers hoped would be taken up in the shrinking and thus allow the needles to perforate through the centres of the white space. Undoubtedly this new form of laying down the plate produced better results than the old form.

As soon as these starred plates appeared collectors immediately realized that a new era in collecting had arrived and that both with perforated stamps, unperforated stamps, and coils, we had a new combination of lines running across 3 mm . instead of 2 mm . as heretofore.

It must also be borne in mind that the starred plates did not come into use until the year 1909 and that in 1910, only one year later, the watermark was changed on our stamps from the old double lined letters to the small single lined letters. Therefore, the life of the starred plates with the old watermark was very brief and they are considerably scarcer than the original plates all of which were spaced 2 mm . apart. This is particularly the case with the 5 c stamp perforated of which only a very few copies are known from starred plates and the rarity of the imprints can be imagined when we state that we have only had two pleces pass through our hands since they appeared.

The first stamp to have the star was the Lincoln which appeared in 1909. This was a little star of solid colour and is also found on the 1c and 2c regular issue perforated and also on the 1c unperforated. As the Lincoln had this solid star only it is, of course, common, but on the other two stamps it is an exceeding rarity and we only know of five sets of imperf 1c with this star, in existence.

The cpen star or second type is, of course, not to be compared with the solid star. The star imprint and spacing was only applied to the 1c, 2c, 3c, 4 c and 5 c values perforated and to the 1 c , 2c and $4 c$ values unperforated.

In the coils, of course, the combination of the spacings occur. There can never, however, be a spacing variety in the line, because it always comes from the centre of the sheet if it be a sidewise coil and if it be an endwise coil, of course, the spacing was cut and the spacing in the joint pair might be anything between 3 mm . and 2 mm . because being joined by hand the stamp may be pasted a little closer or a little further away from the other edge and thls is not of course a collectable variety.

This issue took place in June 1909. Troubled by the shrinking of paper which the "Star" plates failed to overcome the Bureau made an experimental printing on a new kind of paper which contained $331 / 3 \%$ of rag in its makeup. The idea was that the rag would prevent the shrinkage. I believe the officials never meant to issue these stamps but nevertheless they were packed up with the ordinary printings and sent out to Postmasters. Of the 1c, 2c, and 2c Lincoln many were printed and these three values were sold at face value at the Washington Post Office. Of the other values there were only 4000 impressions made with the exception of the 6 c of which there were 5200. These were found as follows:

Thus will be seen the great rarity of the 4 c and 8 c . The few copies that are on the market came thro the exchange made by the National Museum for other stamps needed in the Government Collection.

This issue represents the change of watermark from double line U.S. P. S. to single line letters. It is in this issue also that the new plates were made which were a compromise between the old original plate and the star plate. These new plates are known as A plates and show a uniform spacing of $23 / 4 \mathrm{~mm}$. In this issue also we find the change of perforation in the coils from 12 to $81 / 2$. This change was made to oblige the mailing machine people who found by experience that the 12 perfs made the colls too susceptible to snapping. This $81 / 2$ perforation ran along into 1914 when the new perforation 10 was applied to normal sheets, when the coils also changed to 10 . This brings us to the end of the issue with the perforation 12. The next two series of stamps commence the Perforation 10 series in which we have the subdivision (a) with (b) without watermark. It is in this issue that the Rotary Coils first make their appearance and to distinguish these from their predecessors we term the old coil "Flat Plate." This Perf 10 issue, with watermark ran less than a year, and the stamps whilst available are not plentiful and collectors would do well to look very carefully into this issue and make sure that their two sets are correct since the watermark is often indistinct. The centering on this issue is villanous added to which in 1916, during a shortage of dyes in the printery, the Bureau was hard put to produce the correct colors. In fact some of the values run wild in shade, especially the 3c and 12c. These colors are so marked that we are forced to list them although it will be noticed we have studiously avoided shades whenever possible because that subject is one for the individual taste to carry out as far as is desired. This is about all that it is necessary to state about the following issue and we proceed to list it correctly, we hope, as follows:-

Being a repetition of the last set but on unwatermarked paper still perf 10. This issue is interesting from a double point of view. Firstly it is in this issue that the famous " 5 c error" exists and secondly because it is around the 30 c value that a storm of controversy has arisen. The authorities at Washington teli us that the stamp unwatermarked does not and cannot exist.

But after all there are sheets unwatermarked! The Albemarle Stamp Journal says:-
"Notwithstanding the fact that the "records of the Bureau show that stamps of this denomination were not printed on unwatermarked paper and perforated 10 ."

Fortunately the situation at this critical point is relleved and a calamity averted by the discovery that-"in making watermarked paper the dandy roll is sometimes lifted and unwatermarked paper is made."

Going on further with the technical explanation of paper making we are told:-"It is the practice of the paper mill to have $\alpha$ run of watermarked postage stamp paper follow a run of similar paper without a watermark in order to avoid readjusting or threadIng the machine, and there is always a chance of unwatermarked paper being in the run and escaping the inspection. It is very likely this is what happened, and that a few sheets of unwatermarked paper were printed during the time that watermarked paper was made, and are only now being discovered by the stamp collectors."

This is quite sufficient as an explanation why the 30 c vermilion perf. 10 exists unwatermarked in defiance of the statement of the Bureau people, that the stamps were not printed on unwatermarked paper. We are told by somebody that this makes It "an error of paper" and not an unwatermarked variety, but this is of course not to the point-the point is if this stamp exists unwatermarked it should be included in the catalogue in this set be it an error or be it not."

And now we come to one of the most extraordinary errors that has ever occurred. Plate 7942 is a plate of 400 subjects two cents red. It seems that three impressions on this sheet were defective and the operator at the Bureau took the transfer roll and re-entered these three stamps but instead of taking the 2 c roll he took the 5 c roll so that we find the error in with the regular stamps. This gives us the error of colour 5c red. The lower righthand pane had one error, the upper left hand pane had two errors. Speculation in this stamp was enormous and every post office carefully combed for errors. Notwithstanding orders from the Postmaster General to return any sheets numbered 7942 a very large quantity were bought and hawked around by collectors, semi-collectors, near collectors and just plain pirates. The price is now, we believe, on the bottom and likely to rise rather than fall. The error occurs both on this issue and the following one perf 11.

## TWO DOLLARS PERFORATED

This stamp and its companion the $\$ 5$ was put into circulation because of the high postal values needed to mail parts of time fuses and other material to Russia. We are told that as high as $\$ 125$ worth of stamps were used on one package. With the pressure of work at the Bureau they had no time to make new dies so they laid down two plates with the mother dies of the $\$ 2$ and $\$ 5$ of 1902 , being the heads of Madison and Marshall respectively. The Bureau made new plates because the perf 10 guage would have worked havoc in the narrow space between the stamps on the 1902 plate. The new plates were in 200 impressions and of course with number only.

This series, the current one at the time of making this list, is nothing more than a repetition of the previous set except that we find the perforation changed to 11, which was forecast by that interesting stamp No. 388 which we discussed at length in its proper place. Collectors therefore should be careful not to confuse number 410 with No. 388. The former is watermarked, the latter is not. The error of colour is found in this perforation also, in fact it is more plentiful perf 11 than it is perf 10 . The $\$ 2$ and $\$ 5$ have not appeared perf 11 and we are led to understand that twocolored stamps will replace those that came out earlier in 1917. With the advent of three cent postage we find, as is to be expected, that denomination having the time of its life in shades-of which the end is probably not yet. Several other denominations, also, are lightening up their tints. Really to be exact the imperf 3c is a variety or result of having No. 411 imperf-but as the no watermark series commenced with perf 10 we suppose an imperf without watermark must be listed under that head. The Scott Co. may number the imperf 391a, as we have done; they may number it 411a, either would be logical. There is a great possibility that the 6 c of this value will appear imperf and coiled, being double postal rate, and we quite expect a 13 c value since that represents postage plus registration.

This brings to conclusion the present issue. It would be supposed that poor stamp collectors would be immune to most any kind of a shock but yet once again, a few months ago, we were treated to another sensation.

Here is what the Albemarle Stamp Collector says about it:
The 1908 2c stamp (catalogue No. 324a) perforated 11 is the sensation of the moment. About 586,800 stamps of the above description were received in New York from the Bureau of Engraving, October 9th, and distributed the following day to the substations. None were on hand October 31st when inquiry was made by the Stamp Division at Washington about them. So it is fair to suppose that most of them were used for postage.

The way this variety came about is explained as follows:-
The New York postmaster having had on hand 1467 sheets of the 1908, 2c stamp with double line watermark in imperforate sheets with the uniform spacing between stamps, that he had no use for, returned them to Washington where they were perforated and returned to him. The 11 gauge was used, thus a new variety came into existence, the 12 gauge having been the one used when the stamps were first issued. The imperforate sheets had been transferred from St. Louis to New York in 1910, upon the assumption that they would be used by the U. S. Automatic Vending Co. whose service required the sheets with uniform spacing.

The imperforate sheets had been refused by the Mailometer people in St. Louis, when they found that they could get sheets with the graduated spacing that suited their purposes better.

The P. O. Department finding the stock useless in St. Louis, transferred 1467 sheets of 400 imperforate 2c 1908 to New York in 1910.

The U. S. Automatic Vending Co., not having made use of the imperforates, they remained on hand in New York, until the Postmaster asked to be relieved of the stock. He was then instructed to send the imperforate sheets to the Bureau, to be perforated. This was done and low and behold a New catalogue variety exists!

During the present year the change of the postal rate from $2 c$ to 3 c has resulted in some interesting variations of the 3 c stamp. A new die of the 3c stamp was approved on Dec. 8, 1917 and the first plates from the transfers of this die went to press on Jan. 10, 1918. The first plate was No. 8262. The "Philatelic Gazette" says:-

Formerly the demand for the 2 c denominaiton was vastly in excess of that for any other denomination, and the 2 c die was cut deeper than any of the other dies, so that the transfers would lay down the plates with deeper lines, consequently making the plates stand more wear and last longer. When the rate of postage was raised from $2 c$ to $3 c$, for all deliveries other than local, the demand for the 3 c denominations became vastly in excess of that for any other denomination, so that it was necessary to have the 3 c plates as deeply "bitten" as the 2c plates in order that they might stand the extra work and net wear so rapidly. This required a deeper cut die than the existing one, and a new die was therefore made.

The new die was made in the following manner: It was "laid down" by a transfer from the old die and then carefully "worked over", that is it was re-engraved by having every line cut deeper. Some lines were necsesaryily added, notably to the hair above the ear, the lines of the hair on top of the head and the lines of shading on the forehead were extended slightly forward, the shading of the eye, nostril, and the mouth was slightly altered, and the heavy diagonal lines of shading in the drapery, from the front of the neck to the button, were all extended. The cross-hatching at right, between the medallion oval and the wreath, was also slightly altered. The re-cutting was executed in an exceedingly clever manner and the differences are minute, but they exist none the less.

All engraved plates, beginning with 8262 , have been, and will be, laid down by transfers from the new die.

A proof from the old die was intentionally used for the photographic plate of the surface printed stamp, as it was considered that the finer lines of the old die lent themselves more readily to the manufacture of offset plates.

The "Gazette" says:
The stamp is of the same dimensions as the other postage stamps, but the long axis is horizontal. The central half oval, with flat side to the bottom, contains the picture of an aeroplane, beneath which is a label that contains the word CENTS; in each lower corner an ellipse contains the numerals 24 ; following the curve of the half oval at top is the inscription U. S. POSTAGE, both inscriptions and both numerals are colorless, the space between the curve of the central half oval and the frame line is filled with closely ruled horizontal lines, and in the upper corners, midway between the half oval and the frame lines, is a fancy triangular ornament.

The plates are laid down for one hundred subjects, the frame plate being numbered 8492 and the aeroplnae medallion plate 8493 While the stamp will be used almost exclusively for aeroplane mail, on which the fee is 24 cents, it is a regular postage stamp and available for all postal service fees. The stamp is decidedly patriotic as it can truly be said to bear the national colors, red, white and blue.

## PARCEL POST STAMPS

These very useless stamps came out in 1912. We believe they were issued to keep track in some way as to what the receipts from the parcel post system aggregated, but as many of them were used on ordinary mail.and vice versa it was not long before the authorities decided to discontinue them. Being all in one colour they soon caused mistakes, so the Bureau cut the value in the margin near the plate number-an eloquent tribute to the ineffciency of the issue. There were no spacing varieties and all the sheets were the same size, so barring their ugliness we have nothing further to comment upon. All are single line watermark and all are perf 12 more or less correctly as to centering.

## U. S. BOOKLETS.

Those collectors who have purchased our previous check lists will, of course, notice that for the first time we have included, in this edition, the issues of stamps in Booklets. We do this because in this edition we treat, generally, of lines, guide arrows, and angle blocks. The plates for the booklets being laid down especially for the production of these little books we find peculiar combinations and as practically every little leaf can be obtained a collection of them is of great interest. I am indebted, very deeply indebted, to Mr. George H. Beans for most of this matter. Mr. Beans took the trouble to come a long distance to discuss these plates with me and being by far the largest handler of book plates he undoubtedly knows whereof he speaks. Strictly speaking the 2c of 1898 has no right in this list since it appeared in 1900 and is, therefore, not a Twentieth Century issue, still as that variety is the only Nineteenth Century Booklet, also, was the first of his race, I have decided to list him in with the rest.

There were two kinds of plates used for booklets known as 180 and 360 subject plates.

Let us first consider the 180 subject. The lay out of the plate was as follows:-


## U. S. BOOKLETS

Thus it will be seen that numbers 1, 3, 5 and 7 were blank spaces between the impression. Numbers 2, 4, and 6 were 20 stamps wide and 3 deep. In cutting up the stamps for the booklet leaves, the cuts were made along the top line of Nos. 3, 5 and 7 which enabled the producer to bind the blank edges to the book cover. This also cuts off the arrows at left, right and bottom and splits the arrow at top.

The cross guide line was through the space between the first and second stamps as shown and was a guide to the centre of the sheet.

Thus we get the booklet pane of six stamps always straight edge at left, right and bottom and always with marginal paper at top where the wire stapling was done.

The stamps printed on the 180 subject plate were as follows:-

This ends the 180 subject plates. We now come to the 360 subjects or double the original lay out caused by the increasing demand for booklets by the public. The lay out of this plate is as follows:-

In this plate we notice the horizontal line does not run through the stamp-only through the margin forming varietiea $M, N$, and O. The left, right, and bottom margins are all cut off as in the smaller plate; the top margin remaining as before. In this combination we get the following varieties: A, B, C, D, H to $O$ inclusive. As the horizontal line falls thro the margin and not thro the leaf we find varieties $E, F$ and $G$ eliminated.


At the risk of being accused as too fussy we think it better to repeat the varieties:
A. Plain leaf
B. Top arrow split at right of leaf
C. Top arrow split at left of leaf
D. Plate number
H. Line at right of leaf
I. Line at left of leaf

## U. S. BOOKLETS

These booklets form an interesting little collection by themselves, and have been neglected by the general collector almost entirely. We have some few varieties in stock and will try to secure any especially wanted from other dealers, none of whom have any really well filled stocks of this branch of philatelic wares.

## PRIVATE COMPANIES' COILS

Whilst these stamps are under no possible pretext a Government Issue, still there are many collectors who seem to be interested in them; in fact quite some comment was caused by our leaving them out of the first edition of this book. They are certainly Interesting and perhaps the advanced specialist ought really to have them. It was, of course, for these companies that the regular imperfs. were put on sale in 1907 and from 1907 to 1918 there have been many millions used. The first attempts were generally more or less experimental issues-and several companies sprang into existence who have since passed into the dim distance of history only. The Mailometer or Schermack Company however are still actively manufacturing their colls for use in the Mailometer machine. The prices are about those asked ten years or so agothey will probably remain the same for the next ten years unless a bigger demand springs up.
